Nevertheless, 450 new bodies in the city centre is a sight to be welcomed. The staff have until now been based at Langstone Business Park on the edge of town and few, if any, ventured regularly into Newport. Now the city is their oyster

With their new workplace right in the heart of the city they will naturally be venturing into Newport adding a fresh vibe and vitality to the place. How can we ensure that we benefit from this, dare I say, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity?
